Vision - ESBT will result in a fully **integrated** health and social care economy in East Sussex that makes sure people receive **proactive, joined up care**, supporting them to live as **independently** as possible.





Locality Planning and Delivery


- A locality is a defined geographical area - based on current GP Locality footprints;
- ESBT localities were identified as the **building blocks** for how we could support delivery of this aim and transform our local NHS, shaping and delivering services for local people differently in the future;
- **We established six Locality Planning and Delivery Groups (LPDGs) across the ESBT footprint, coterminous to our existing Primary Care Locality footprints;**
- LPDGs are a **place to plan** and design local service provision based on identified priorities to inform local decision making for the community within clearly defined parameters;
- LPDGs are a **place to deliver** integrated health and social care to clearly defined outcomes;
- They adopt a whole system approach with local system leadership. They are primary & community care led with a multi-professional approach (health, social care and voluntary sectors) and publicly engaged.





Locality Planning and Delivery – Key Functions

- Opportunity to ensure the **voice** of localities are at the heart of how we plan and how we act as a system;
- Foster **closer partnerships** to promote the co-ordination and integration of services locally;
- **Determine local priorities** focussing use of resources where it makes biggest impact;
- Oversee the **quality and quantity of care services** within a locality to deliver improved outcomes for the local community;
- Strengthened local **networks** between the health and care system and the wider system of support;



- Evolving picture - the aim is to get to a greater **collective** understanding of **local need, activity** and cost effective **solutions**.
- **Fulfil our ambition to invest wisely.**

Locality Planning and Delivery – Progress to date

- **Core membership** has been fully agreed. The inaugural meetings were held in Nov-Dec 2017. Draft Terms of Reference have been adopted in each group. These meetings are now up and running in each area;
- **Fostering closer partnerships** through engagement and involvement of a number of public sector partners, community pharmacy, the independent sector, housing, and the voluntary and community sector (VCS). This reflects a willingness and commitment to work collaboratively to enhance the provision of locally appropriate support and services;
- Production by Public Health of **summary locality profiles** based on JSNA and local intelligence.
- Initial **priority areas** for development agreed across each locality
- Clear conduit to help drive the implementation of **social prescribing**





Priorities / emerging themes

Bexhill LPDG:

- Delivering our health and well-being community hubs;
- Empowering older people with limiting long term illness through self-help groups and peer support;
- Considering how we best tackle health inequalities faced by young families/parents in deprived areas;
- Better coordinating our community services to support admission avoidance;

Rother LPDG:

- Development of a locality focused single directorate of service to support people access the right person first and raising awareness of community based assets;
- Integrating community services directory of services with the GP Federation website development together with the development of information booths in each practice.

All LPDG's – conduit to support development of social prescribing





Rother and Bexhill Community Networks

The **purpose of Locality Networks** is to share information and resources, build relationships and collaboration, provide opportunities for mutual support and learning and strengthen community based services.

In 2017/18, four networks ran each in Bexhill and Rural Rother attracting a total of **282 participants** from the community and voluntary sector, public sector and independent sectors.

Each network was **themed** covering Communication Between the Generations, Befriending and Volunteering, Utilising Social Media, Information and Signposting, Assets and Needs, and Design.

The **priorities highlighted by participants** include intergenerational opportunities, befriending, getting and supporting volunteers, directories/access to community information, taking the community to the housebound, the lack of hubs, improving communication, access to services and transport, community resilience, strategic commissioning, and better using existing infrastructure.
